**Approving and authorizing the continued use of the governmental program at the MacPhail Center for Music facility.**

Whereas, Minnesota Laws 2006, Chapter 258, Article 1, Section 4, Subdivision 4, authorizes the City of Minneapolis to undertake the design, construction and operation of the MacPhail Center for Music facility; to establish the MacPhail Center for Music facility as a governmental program providing music education, music therapy, and music education programming in public and private schools and in partnership with other organizations; and to appropriate funds for such purposes; and

Whereas, in 2006 the City accepted a \$5,000,000 bond grant from the State of Minnesota to design, construct, furnish and equip the MacPhail Center for Music facility in the City of Minneapolis; and

Whereas, to satisfy conditions of the State bond grant, the City must own or ground lease the MacPhail Center for Music facility, and enter into a use/lease agreement with MacPhail Center for Music under which it will take on the responsibility for the operation of the musical institution and the governmental program at the facility; and

Whereas, on July 21, 2006, the City Council adopted the governmental program to be achieved by the City's sponsorship of the MacPhail Center for Music facility to construct, equip and operate a music education center that includes studios, classrooms, and a performance hall, together with educational programming, other cultural performances, and related and ancillary uses in the City of Minneapolis, pursuant to which the City expects to support cultural participation and encourage economic development and tourism; and

Whereas, pursuant to the State bond grant the City is required to annually report to the State on the operation of the MacPhail Center for Music facility and approve its continued use for the governmental program; and

Whereas, pursuant to the use/lease agreement MacPhail Center for Music has submitted annual current and projected budgets for the operation of the governmental program at the MacPhail Center for Music facility to the City; and

Whereas, the City's Department of Community Planning and Economic Development (CPED Department) Director or authorized designee has reviewed and approved the budgets for the operation of the governmental program at the MacPhail Center for Music facility submitted by MacPhail Center for Music to the City and found (i) that the Program budget for fiscal year 2026 shows that revenues from all sources are equal to or exceed Program expenses; (ii) that the projected Program budgets for fiscal years 2027 through 2029 show that revenues from all sources are equal to or exceed forecast Program expenses; and (iii) that the operation of the MacPhail Center for Music facility by MacPhail Center for Music continues to meet the requirements of the governmental program;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by The City Council of The City of Minneapolis:

That based on the reports and documents submitted by MacPhail Center for Music, the review performed by City staff and the findings of the CPED Department Director, the City Council finds (i) that the current

MacPhail Center for Music facility governmental program budget for fiscal year 2026 shows that revenues from all sources are equal to or exceed Program expenses; (ii) that the projected MacPhail Center for Music facility governmental program budgets for fiscal years 2027 through 2029 show that projected revenues from all sources are equal to or exceed forecast program expenses; and (iii) that the operation of the MacPhail Center for Music facility by MacPhail Center for Music continues to meet the requirements of the governmental program. Whereas, despite being marked for a rush warrant, the MPD investigator did not submit the investigation of the July 30, 2022, report to the Hennepin County Attorney’s Office for charging consideration (“Report on After-Action Reviews,” Hogan Adams, PLLC; “AAR”); and

Whereas, differing views on Crime Lab involvement highlighted the need for more consistent protocols around scene processing and evidence preservation (AAR); and

Whereas, incomplete early documentation weakened later investigations, and MPD did not obtain the Medical Examiner’s report for its homicide investigation until the Minneapolis Office of the City Auditor requested it (AAR); and

Whereas, in the Lussier case, inconsistent communication with the Medical Examiner contributed to incorrect internal assumptions (AAR); and

Whereas, Allison’s Law would require coroners and medical examiners to screen deaths classified as suicide, overdose, or accident for indicators of concealed domestic violence homicide; mandate coordination between law enforcement agencies and coroners and medical examiners before a case may be closed; offer to interview the victim’s family members before a final determination of cause or manner of death is issued in domestic violence-related suspicious death cases; and direct the POST Board to develop training on staged crime scenes and domestic homicide indicators;

(2) *Tier 5 Bodies.* This chapter shall not apply to Tier 5 Bodies, except for Section 10.20(b)(5) and the ethics education training requirement in Section 10.80(b)(3), which shall apply. Other provisions of this chapter shall apply only if expressly adopted by the enabling legislation.

(3) *Tier 2 Bodies; Tier 3 Bodies created by ordinance.* Sections 10.10, 10.20, 10.90, and 10.110 and the ethics education training requirement in Section 10.80(b)(3) shall apply to all Tier 2 Bodies and also to Tier 3 Bodies to the extent such Tier 3 Bodies are already existing pursuant to this code of ordinances on the effective date of this Chapter. The remaining sections of this chapter shall not apply to these bodies as long as the enabling legislation continues in effect without amendment. However, the city council may by ordinance amendment make any or all additional parts of this chapter applicable to such Tier 2 and Tier 3 Bodies.

(4) *Tier 3 Bodies created by resolution.* This chapter, inclusive of all its sections, shall apply to all existing Tier 3 Bodies created by resolution. This chapter shall supersede any inconsistent prior resolutions. The city clerk shall bring forward new resolutions to conform already existing Tier 3 Bodies created by resolution with the provisions of this Chapter.

(5) This chapter shall apply to all Tier 2, 3, and 4 Bodies created by the city council after the effective date of this Chapter. Nothing in this chapter shall apply to or limit the mayor's creation of advisory groups intended to advise the mayor.

Section 2. That Section 10.80 contained in Chapter 10, Boards, Commissions and Advisory Bodies, be amended to read as follows:

**10.80. – Oversight, orientation, restrictions, and requirements.** (a) *Oversight.* Each body shall report to the mayor and to a designated standing committee of the city council, which the city council shall determine as part of its organization and as needed from time to time thereafter.

(b) *Orientation.*

(1) The city clerk shall develop and oversee an orientation program to inform all newly appointed and reappointed members about the general functions, powers, and duties of the body to which they have been appointed, applicable laws and policies, and the city's expectations of members. Each newly appointed or reappointed member shall participate in the clerk's orientation and must complete and return to the clerk a written acknowledgement of completion.

(2) All members shall sign a participant agreement acknowledging the duties and responsibilities of the appointment, in a form approved by the city attorney, as part of the clerk's orientation process.

~~(3) All newly appointed or reappointed members shall complete and file the oath required by Section 10.50(e)(3), sign and return to the clerk the participant agreement, and successfully complete the clerk's orientation and return to the clerk the written acknowledgment thereof before serving on the body and in any event no later than ninety (90) days after appointment or reappointment. Any member who fails to complete these requirements within ninety (90) days after appointment or reappointment shall be deemed to have resigned and the position shall be deemed vacant. All newly appointed or reappointed members must complete the following requirements within ninety (90) days after appointment or reappointment:~~

a. Complete and file the oath required by Section 10.50(e)(3);

b. Sign and return to the clerk the participant agreement;

c. Successfully complete the clerk's orientation; and

d. Successfully complete the ethics education training required in the city's Code of Ethics in Chapter 15, Ethics in Government.

Any member who fails to complete these requirements ninety (90) days after appointment or reappointment will be deemed to have resigned and the position will be vacant.

(4) If a member who has signed a participant agreement fails or refuses to abide by it, the body of which the member is a part may bring this failure or refusal to the attention of the city clerk, who will advise the appointing authority of the reported conduct. The appointing authority may take any action it deems appropriate up to and including removal of the member, if not otherwise prohibited by law.

*(c) Restrictions on service.*

(1) A member may not serve concurrently on more than one (1) body to which this section applies unless this restriction is waived by a majority vote of the city council. A member of a Tier 1 or Tier 5 Body may not also serve concurrently on a Tier 2, 3, or 4 Body unless this restriction is waived by a majority vote of the city council.

(2) A member may not be reappointed to a body if the member has already served consecutively on the same body for eight (8) or more years, unless this restriction is waived by a majority vote of the city council.

(3) A member may not serve on a body concurrently with another member with whom the person shares a significant familial relationship as defined in Section 15.280 of the Code of Ordinances.

(4) Neither the mayor nor any city council member shall serve as a member of a body unless charter or ordinance specifically provides that the seat shall be filled by a person holding that office.

(5) No current city employee shall be a member of a body.

(6) Any member who runs for any elective office, or who seeks appointment to fill a vacancy in an elective office, must take a leave of absence from the body while seeking election or appointment to the position. This leave begins on the date that the member files for or is nominated to the elective office or applies for appointment to fill a vacancy in the elective office. Any attendance requirements pursuant to Section 10.40(a)(2)(d) shall not apply to the member during this leave of absence.

(7) This Subsection (c) shall not apply to members who, by law or custom, are appointed by another organization or unit of government.

(d) *Ethics.* All members must comply with the city's Code of Ethics as set forth in Chapter 15, Ethics in Government, ~~and must complete ethics training on a schedule to be determined by the city council and the city's ethics officer.~~

(e) *Compensation.* Members shall serve without compensation unless such compensation is expressly provided for in the enabling legislation or resolution and the required resources are appropriated by the city.

Section 3. That Section 15.260 contained in Chapter 15, Ethics in Government, be amended to read as follows:

**15.260. Ethics education.** ~~Each local official or employee shall attend an ethics education seminar within twelve (12) months of the effective date of this Code. New employees and local officials shall participate in an~~ New employees and elected local officials shall complete ethics education training within six (6) months of becoming a local official or employee. Employees shall participate in complete ethics education training every three (3) years thereafter. Non-employee local officials and elected local officials shall participate in an Elected local officials shall complete ethics education training every four (4) years thereafter. A non-employee local official shall complete ethics education training within the time frame required for completion of orientation in Section 10.80 (b)(3) of this Code each time the non-employee local official is appointed or reappointed to a body. Employees in the job titles of election judge and stagehand/production technician temporary intermittent are exempt from this education requirement but shall be provided a copy of this Code upon hire. The training shall educate persons as to their duties and responsibilities under this Code. The human resources department shall design and implement the ethics education training. Department heads are responsible for ensuring that all of their employees attend this training.

**Recognizing June 2, 2026, as National Mississippi River Day in the city of Minneapolis.**

Whereas, the Mississippi River is one of our nation's most iconic and vital waterways, spanning approximately 2,350 miles from Minnesota to Louisiana and uniting ten mainstem states and 32 tributary states in its watershed; and

Whereas, the Mississippi River has been deeply woven into the lives of Indigenous peoples for thousands of years, sustaining communities through nourishment, travel, and trade while also holding profound cultural, spiritual, and ancestral significance; and

Whereas, the Mississippi River serves as a critical source of drinking water for over 20 million Americans, a vital habitat for diverse fish and wildlife, and a powerful economic engine supporting commerce, agriculture, tourism, and recreation; and

Whereas, the River is the heart of a migratory flyway for 60% of North America's bird species, provides habitat for at least 260 fish species, and sustains numerous amphibians, reptiles, and mammals, making it one of the world's most important ecological corridors; and

Whereas, the health of the Mississippi River is under threat from pollution, habitat loss, climate change, and other environmental stressors, which impact the communities, economies, and ecosystems that depend on it; and

Whereas, protecting and restoring the Mississippi River requires collaboration across states, agencies, organizations, individuals, and communities to implement sustainable and regenerative conservation practices, restore wetlands and floodplains, and reduce agricultural and urban runoff to improve water quality; and

Whereas, the Mississippi River connects millions of people, reflecting our shared history, culture, and responsibility to ensure its vitality for future generations; and

Whereas, One Mississippi and its network of 78 organizations and 20,000 River Citizens invite everyone to take action—whether through conservation efforts, advocacy, or simply enjoying the River and building community—especially during the One Mississippi's River Days of Action (June 1-15), when people across the region come together to restore, celebrate, and advocate for a healthier River;

**RESOLUTION 2026R-209**

**Chavez, Payne, Wonsley, Rainville, Vetaw, Warren, Osman,  
Shaffer, Stevenson, Chughtai, Whiting, Chowdhury, and Palmisano**

**Recognizing May 25, 2026, as the sixth year since the police murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis that sparked a global catalyst for justice.**

Whereas, George Floyd was born on October 14, 1973, in Fayetteville, North Carolina, later moving to Houston, Texas, where he grew up playing basketball and football throughout high school and college; and

Whereas, in adulthood, Mr. Floyd worked hard to make changes in his life centered in religious mentorship, community service, and messages of anti-violence; and

Whereas, Mr. Floyd moved to the Minneapolis area in 2014 where he worked as a truck driver and provided security as a bouncer at local small businesses. He was a beloved father, brother, relative, and friend who declared throughout his life that he would one day “change the world”; and

Whereas, on May 25, 2020, near the intersection of 38th Street and Chicago Avenue, now known as ‘George Floyd Square,’ after making a store purchase, George Floyd was confronted by four Minneapolis police officers whose actions led to his horrific murder and the kneeling on his neck by former Minneapolis Police Officer Derek Chauvin for over nine minutes; and

Whereas, what is commonly known as the 8-minute, 46-second video, but is actually 9 minutes and 29 seconds long, that captured the murder was taken by a bystander and minor at the time whose quick thinking and instinct proved integral to the ensuing global protest of police brutality and systemic racism, the movement for racial justice, and the criminal convictions of the four officers responsible for Mr. Floyd’s murder and the violation of his civil rights; and

Whereas, community members, activists, and organizers immediately came together to preserve artworks and other offerings and to regularly assemble at George Floyd Square; advocate for solutions to dismantle systemic racism including the ‘24 Demands,’ as well as create on the ground memorials like the fist sculpture at the intersection, garden, and ‘Say Their Names Cemetery;’ and

Whereas, Mr. Floyd’s murder launched legal investigations by the Minnesota Department of Human Rights and the United States Department of Justice into the violation of civil rights by the MPD. The probe lasted over three years and resulted in court enforceable agreements due to findings of pattern and practice that the MPD “uses excessive force, including unjustified deadly force and unreasonable use of tasers; unlawfully discriminates against Black people and Native American people in its enforcement activities,

including the use of force following stops; violates the rights of people engaged in protected speech; and along with the City, discriminates against people with behavioral health disabilities when responding to calls for assistance”; and

Whereas, The City of Minneapolis began crafting and implementing police reforms immediately following the murder of George Floyd as the investigations happened. This included banning the use of chokeholds, requiring officers to report and intervene when they witness unauthorized uses of force, making changes to the use and protocol of crowd control munitions, among other important reforms; and

Whereas, The City of Minneapolis continues to confront this legacy through mourning, resistance, healing, and the pursuit of equity and transformation. The City has committed to ongoing work that recognizes the collective pain and trauma caused by the police murder of George Floyd through racial healing and restorative justice initiatives, transforming traditional policing, improving police accountability, investing in upstream solutions, and dismantling systemic racism at the City of Minneapolis; and

Whereas, The City of Minneapolis is transforming traditional policing into a community safety ecosystem by improving community access and input into the oversight of police; investing in violence prevention programs, restorative justice and racial healing initiatives, alternative response models, embedded mental health responders; and co-locating police precincts with other services to address community needs more holistically, among others;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by The City Council of The City of Minneapolis:

That the Mayor and City Council do hereby recognize May 25, 2026, as the sixth year since the police murder of George Floyd that sparked a global catalyst for justice and acknowledge there is much work yet to be done to address systemic racism at the City of Minneapolis.
