Rescinding Resolution 2025R-397 and authorizing sale of land Disposition Parcel RE2024-346 under the Emergency Stabilization Pilot program at 3726 Logan Ave N.

Whereas, the City Council adopted Resolution 2025-397 on November 20, 2025, authorizing the sale of land Disposition Parcel RE2024-346 under the Emergency Stabilization Pilot program at 3726 Logan Ave N to Homes for Homies LLC, and the developer supports the removal of this home from the program portfolio for the City to sell directly to the tenant homebuyer to provide an affordable homeownership opportunity at less than 80% of area median income (AMI);

Whereas, the City of Minneapolis, hereinafter known as the City, has received an offer to purchase and develop Disposition Parcel RE2024-346 from Joycelyn Holliday, hereinafter known as the Purchaser, the Parcel RE2024-346, being the following described land situated in the City of Minneapolis, County of Hennepin, State of Minnesota, to wit:

Legal Description of Disposition Parcel RE2024-346; 3726 Logan Ave N: Lot 15, Block 8, Newlon and Folwells Addition to Minneapolis; and

Whereas, the Purchaser has offered to pay the sum of \$53,000 for Parcel RE2024-346; to the City for the land and improvements and is currently leasing the property from the City; and

Whereas, the Purchaser has submitted to the City statements of financial responsibility and qualifications; and

Whereas, the City has had the re-use value reviewed by an appraisal expert, stating that the re-use value opinion is consistent with accepted methods of aiding the City in determining a \$167,000 re-use value for the Parcel; and

Whereas, pursuant to due notice thereof published in *Finance and Commerce* on June 5, 2026, a public hearing on the proposed sale was duly held on June 16, 2026, in the City Council Chambers at the Minneapolis City Hall, 350 5th St S, Room 380, in the City of Minneapolis, County of Hennepin, State of Minnesota.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by The City Council of The City of Minneapolis:

Resolution 2025R-397 is hereby rescinded.

Be It Further Resolved that the re-use value for uses in accordance with the Program is hereby determined to be the sum of \$167,000 for Parcel RE2024-346.

Be It Further Resolved that the purchase price for the Disposition Parcel shall be \$53,000 with a write down of \$114,000 to sell the home to the tenant homebuyer.

Be It Further Resolved that the acceptance of the offer is hereby determined to be in the best interests of the City and its people and that the transaction furthers the City's general plan of economic development in accordance with the City's approved disposition policy and it is further determined that the Purchaser possesses the qualifications and financial resources necessary to acquire the parcel.

Be It Further Resolved that the Purchaser's proposal is hereby accepted, subject to the execution of a contract for the sale of land and further subject to the condition that land sale closing must occur on or before December 31, 2026.

Be It Further Resolved that the sale conditions described above may be waived or amended with the approval of the Department of Community Planning & Economic Development Director. Be It Further Resolved that upon publication of this Resolution, the Finance Officer or other appropriate official of the City be and the same is hereby authorized to execute and deliver the contract to the Purchaser as appropriate; provided, however, that this Resolution does not constitute such a contract and no such contract shall be created until executed by the Finance Officer or other appropriate official of the City.

Be It Further Resolved that the Finance Officer or other appropriate official of the City is hereby to execute and deliver a conveyance of the land to the Purchaser, as appropriate; in accordance with the provisions of the executed contract and upon payment to the City for the purchase price thereof; provided, however, that this Resolution does not constitute such a conveyance and no such conveyance shall be created until executed and delivered by the Finance Officer or other appropriate City official of the City.

Amending Title 13, Chapter 319 of the Minneapolis Code of Ordinances relating to Licenses and Business Regulations: Open Air Motor Vehicle Parking Lots.

The City Council of the City of Minneapolis do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 319.310 of the above-entitled ordinance be amended to read as follows:

319.310. Prohibited acts. (a) The licensee of a parking lot shall not permit the repairing except in an emergency, dismantling or wrecking of any motor vehicle or the storage of any junk motor vehicle on the parking lot.

(b) No person shall charge, or offer to charge, a fee for parking on any property other than a validly licensed commercial parking lot.

(c) No licensee of a parking lot, nor an agent or employee of a licensee, shall encourage, knowingly allow, or knowingly permit the possession or consumption of intoxicating liquor or 3.2 percent malt liquor, as defined by Minnesota Statutes, Section 340A.101, by any person on the licensed premises except where such possession or consumption has been expressly permitted by license or permit granted under Title 13 or Title 14. This prohibition shall not apply to Class A commercial parking lots located within the area commencing at the centerline of 4th Avenue South and ~~6th~~ 7th Street South in a southeasterly direction to the centerline of 13th Avenue South; thence northeasterly along the centerline of 13th Avenue South and ~~6th~~ 7th Street South to the centerline of West River Parkway; thence northwesterly along the centerline of West River Parkway and 13th Avenue South to the centerline of 12th Avenue South; thence southwesterly along the centerline of 12th Avenue South and West River Parkway to the centerline of Washington Avenue South; thence northwesterly along the centerline of Washington Avenue South and 12th Avenue South to the centerline of 5th Avenue South; thence southwesterly along the centerline of 5th Avenue South and Washington Avenue South to the centerline of 3rd Street South; thence northwesterly along the centerline of 3rd Street South and 5th Avenue South to the centerline of 4th Avenue South; thence southwesterly along the centerline of 4th Avenue South and 3rd Street South to the centerline of ~~6th~~ 7th Street South. All activities shall be limited to the six (6) hours prior to event start time and three (3) hours after the termination of the event.

(d) Class A commercial parking lots offering special event parking shall not permit, or provide wood burning fires of any kind. Licensees may permit patrons to prepare food on charcoal or propane grills provided that appropriate refuse containers are available and that parking lot litter control measures are enacted.

Amending Title 13, Chapter 267 of the Minneapolis Code of Ordinances relating to Licenses and Business Regulations: Amusements.

The City Council of the City of Minneapolis do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Section 267.1110 of the above-entitled ordinance be amended to read as follows:

267.1110. Definitions. When used in this article, the following terms shall mean:

Entertainment includes shows, plays, skits, musical revues, children's theater, dance productions, public dance, musical concerts, opera and the production or provision of sights or sounds or visual or auditory sensations which are designed to or may divert, entertain or otherwise appeal to members of the public who are admitted to a place of entertainment, which is produced by any means, including radio, phonograph, television, video reproduction, tape recorder, piano, orchestra or band or any other musical instrument, slide or movie projector, spotlights, or interruptible or flashing light devices and decoration.

Place of entertainment means any privately owned place wherein entertainment is offered or given to the public, whether or not a fee is charged for admission thereto and whether or not sales of property are made upon the premises, other than religious associations or corporations organized for at least three (3) years, pursuant to Minn. Statutes Chapter 315 or 317A, and the following activities licensed by the city pursuant to provisions of this Code of Ordinances: Theaters under Article XVI, dance halls under Article XIII, carnivals under Article V, places licensed for "on-sale" beer, wine or liquor under Chapter 362, 363 or 366, food establishments licensed under Section 188.160 as a restaurant or food manufacturer having a public area less than two thousand five hundred (2,500) net square feet which provide limited entertainment as defined under section 360.50 of this code, or places primarily devoted to the display and sale of radios, phonographs, tape recorders, pianos, musical instruments, records and tapes, moving pictures, television, and stage equipment.

Public dance means any event in which dancing, wherein the public may participate, is carried on, and to which admission may be had by the public by payment, either directly or indirectly, of an admission fee, price for dancing, or a fee for a membership in a club.

The phrase *booths, stalls, or partitioned portions of a room or individual rooms* means enclosures which are part of a business operated on the premises which offers movies or other entertainment to be viewed within the enclosure, including enclosures wherein movies or other entertainment is dispensed for a fee. The phrase *booths, stalls, or partitioned portions of a room or individual rooms* does not mean enclosures which are private offices used by the owners, managers, or persons employed on the premises for attending to the tasks of their employment, and which are not held out to the public or members of the

establishment for hire or for a fee or for the purpose of viewing movies or other entertainment for a fee and are not open to any persons other than employees.

The phrase *doors, curtains, or portal partitions* means full, complete, nontransparent closure devices through which one cannot see or view activity taking place within the enclosure.

The phrase *open to an adjacent public room so that the area inside is visible to persons in the adjacent public room* means either the absence of any "door, curtain or portal partition" or a door or other device which is made of clear, transparent material such as glass, plexiglass or other similar material meeting building code and safety standards, which permits the activity inside the enclosure to be viewed or seen by persons outside the enclosure.

Section 2. That Section 267.1180 of the above-entitled ordinance be amended to read as follows:

267.1180. Regulations applicable to adult entertainment. (a) *Applicability and enforcement.* Any establishment required by this Code to hold a business license which qualifies as an adult entertainment center as defined in the zoning code shall comply with all requirements of this section. Any violation of a requirement of this section shall constitute a violation of this Code subject to all authorized penalties and methods of enforcement and shall additionally and alternatively constitute good cause for the imposition of reasonable, progressive, and appropriate adverse license action. The requirements of this section shall be enforced by the licensing official or the licensing official's designee and enforcement shall be in accord with any applicable standard protocols.

(b) *Physical space and maintenance requirements.* The following space and maintenance requirements shall apply to all adult entertainment centers.

(1) No facility shall contain any partition between subdivisions of a room, portion or part of a building, structure, or premises, having an aperture which is designed or constructed to facilitate sexual activity between persons on opposite sides of the partition. All portions of the facility shall comply with the building standards of section 219.520 as applicable to any booths, stalls, or partitioned portions of a room, or individual rooms, in addition to any further requirements imposed on such areas by this section.

(2) All portions of the facility shall comply with all applicable building and fire code requirements, in addition to any other applicable local, state or federal law, rule, requirement or ordinance. All entertainer dressing rooms shall comply with applicable conditions of the United States Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), including but not limited to 29 CFR 1910.141(c)(1)(i) regarding toilet facilities.

(3) All areas of the facility shall be illuminated to an average of one (1) foot candle or greater as measured four (4) feet from the floor.

(4) All areas of the facility shall be clean and maintained in good repair, including any dressing room and stage areas. All walking surfaces, including those limited to staff or entertainer use, shall be free of uneven surfaces or tripping hazards. All seating, chairs, or other furniture designed or utilized for customer seating as a performance area shall feature cleanable, non-porous surfaces. Any dance or performance poles used by entertainers shall be cleaned with an appropriate sanitizer by a non-entertainer staff member of the facility prior to entertainment on stage beginning each business day, and upon request of any entertainer.

(5) No facility shall contain booths, stalls, or partitioned portions of a room, or individual rooms, used for the viewing of entertainment, having doors, curtains, or portal partitions, unless such booths, stalls,

partitioned portions of a room, or individual rooms so used shall have at least one (1) side open to an adjacent public room so that the area inside is visible to persons in the adjacent public room. No door, curtain, material or other obstruction may be installed or present over the entrance to any semi-enclosed or private space which entertainers are able to occupy with any customers. The entrance to any such space shall be a minimum of twenty-eight (28) inches in width. Any non-transparent partition or wall enclosing such a space shall be no greater than five (5) feet in height. No couches, sofas or other furniture designed for seating and greater than four (4) feet in length may be present in any such space. No bed, daybed, futon, mattress or other piece of furniture designed for sleeping may be present in any such space, nor may any sheets or bedding be present. Such space shall be lighted in a manner that the persons in the space are visible from the adjacent public rooms, but such lighting shall not be of such intensity as to prevent the viewing of any motion pictures or other offered entertainment.

(6) Any spill involving bodily fluids shall be immediately cleaned by a non-entertainer staff member with an approved sanitizer using appropriate personal protective equipment. Standard procedures to address such spills including staff training shall be developed and maintained by the establishment. The standard procedures and training materials required by this subsection shall be maintained at the establishment and made available to the licensing official or the licensing official's designee upon request.

(7) A notice detailing the legal rights of entertainers as provided by city, state or federal law, in a format approved by the licensing official, shall be posted in any entertainer dressing room in an approved location that is readily observable by entertainers.

(8) A notice detailing the rules of conduct as required by applicable law to be followed by customers, in a format approved by the licensing official, shall be posted in each semi-enclosed or private space, the primary entrance to the establishment, and in each restroom in approved locations that are readily observable by customers. The notice shall state that customers must remain fully clothed at all times, abide by all laws prohibiting indecent conduct and are not allowed in dressing rooms or other nonpublic areas of the establishment. The notice shall further state that the premises are subject to video surveillance and that customers must act respectfully towards entertainers and staff and may not use derogatory or harassing language. The notice may also contain any other lawful content deemed appropriate by the licensing official.

(c) *Security camera plan required.* All establishments shall submit an approved security camera plan to the licensing official, detailing the security camera system utilized at the facility and providing a map of the placement and scope of each security camera. The security camera plan shall ensure that the camera system is operable and that the footage from each camera is secured and maintained for a minimum of fourteen (14) days and a maximum of thirty (30) days, unless otherwise required by law, court order, or for legitimate evidentiary spoliation considerations. Any footage may only be accessed by individuals approved by the establishment in its security plan for legitimate security, legal defense or law enforcement purposes and no footage may be disseminated or accessed for any other purposes not specified in this subsection or in the approved security plan, subject to all penalties and enforcement actions authorized in subsection (a). The plan shall ensure that the cameras are positioned in a manner such that they cover all areas of the facility in which entertainers may interact with or perform for customers. Cameras shall not cover dressing rooms or other spaces in which entertainers have a reasonable expectation of privacy and do not interact with or perform for customers. All establishments shall provide, or make available for inspection, such camera footage or associated data to the licensing official, at such times and in a format and manner prescribed by the licensing official. Data provided pursuant to this section shall be deemed to be not public data to the extent permissible under the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act or other applicable law. The licensing official shall promulgate a policy to ensure that any such data received by or provided to city staff is protected and safeguarded to

the fullest extent permitted by law, and that access is strictly limited to appropriate and identified individuals for legitimate purposes. To the extent required by applicable law, a licensed establishment shall be entitled to an opportunity for pre-compliance review which may entail an expedited review of any objected-to security camera footage request by a municipal hearing officer. The hearing officer shall affirm the footage request upon a showing by the city that access to the footage is reasonably calculated to effectuate and further the lawful regulatory duties created by this section and existing law, and that no other lawful reason to quash or modify such request has been demonstrated. To the extent permitted by law, the decision of the hearing officer may be appealed to and reviewed by the district courts of the State of Minnesota. Nothing in this subsection shall preclude a law enforcement agency from obtaining such footage or data by warrant, subpoena, court order or other lawful method.

(d) *Entertainer contracts or employment agreement requirements.* All entertainers employed at or contracted to perform in establishments covered by this section shall be provided a written or electronic copy of their employment agreement or independent contractor agreement prior to performing any employment or contractor services and thereafter upon request. All such entertainers shall also be provided with written information from the establishment, prior to performing any employment or contractor services and thereafter upon request or upon any alteration of such policies, procedures, processes, or rules, detailing the establishment's anti-discrimination and sexual harassment policies, procedures and reporting processes, as well the rules and expectations of the establishment including any house fees or charges and an explanation of reasons that would justify termination of the employment agreement or independent contractor arrangement. All such entertainers shall also be provided with written notice, in a form approved by the licensing official, of their rights under city, state and federal law. Copies of the information and agreements required by this subsection, excluding any personal identifying information, shall be provided to, or made available for inspection by, the licensing official or the licensing official's designee.

(e) *Staff training requirements.* All staff members, including employees and independent contractors, shall be provided materials approved by the licensing official, addressing sexual harassment, sexual assault and nondiscrimination in addition to any other relevant topic. Additionally, all employees shall be provided training by the establishment covering the same topics on at least an annual basis, in a format approved by the licensing official.

(f) *Required security for entertainers.* All establishments covered by this section shall provide adequate and equitable security services and personnel to maintain a safe and orderly environment on the premises and in any parking areas, and to protect the personal safety of all entertainers. Security escorts shall be made available to all entertainers to their means of transportation when departing the establishment.

(g) *Manager and security staff requirements.* For purposes of this subsection, the term "manager" shall mean an on-site staff member of an establishment covered by this section who exercises significant control and administration over the operation of the establishment in a supervisory capacity oftentimes inclusive of hiring and scheduling authority. All managers must be disclosed on the license application on file with the licensing official and the appointment of any new managers shall require an immediate update to such application. All establishments shall perform a criminal history record check on all managers and security staff, as well as any candidates for such positions, using a service or method approved by the licensing official, and no person with a criminal conviction within the previous five (5) years for a qualified domestic violence-related offense, as that term is defined in Minn. Statutes, Section 609.02, Subd. 16, shall be permitted to serve in such a capacity.

(h) *Prohibition on employer participation in gratuity sharing.* Pursuant to Minn. Statutes, Section 177.24 Subd. 3, no employer may participate in any agreement to share gratuities between employees or coerce

employees to share gratuities. For the purposes of this subsection, "participation" includes acceptance by any owner or manager of any gratuity from any employee or independent contractor. For purposes of this subsection, "manager" has the same meaning given to that term in subsection (g).

(i) *Retaliation prohibited.* No establishment shall engage in retaliation of any kind, as that term is defined in section 139.20 of this Code, against individuals, employees, or contractors who have made good faith reports or complaints of violations of this section.

(j) *Severability.* If any portion of this section is determined to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, that portion shall be deemed severed from the section, and such determination shall not affect the validity of the remainder of the section. If the application of any provision of this chapter to a particular person, class, entity or establishment is determined to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such determination shall not affect the application of said provision to any other person, class, entity or establishment.

On behalf of the Business, Housing & Zoning Committee, Osman offered Ordinance 2026-016 amending Title 21 of the Minneapolis Code of Ordinances relating to Interim Ordinances, adding a new Chapter 597 providing for a moratorium on the establishment, re-establishment, or expansion of data center uses.

The following is the complete text of the unpublished summarized ordinance.

Amending Title 21 of the Minneapolis Code of Ordinances by adding a new Chapter 597 to Interim Ordinances: Providing for a moratorium on the establishment, re-establishment, or expansion of data centers.

The City Council of the City of Minneapolis do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That the Minneapolis Code of Ordinances be amended by adding thereto a new Chapter 597 to read as follows:

**CHAPTER 597. PROVIDING FOR A MORATORIUM ON THE ESTABLISHMENT,
RE-ESTABLISHMENT, OR EXPANSION OF DATA CENTERS**

597.10. Authority. Pursuant to Minn. Statutes section 462.355, subd. 4, the city is authorized to establish interim ordinances to regulate, restrict, or prohibit any use or development in all or a part of the city while the city or its planning department is conducting studies, or has authorized a study to be conducted, or has scheduled a hearing to consider adoption or amendment of the comprehensive plan or official zoning

controls. In furtherance of this statutory authority, the city has enacted Chapter 529, Article VII, of the zoning code, which governs the establishment of interim ordinances. The city declares that this interim ordinance is established pursuant to this statutory and local ordinance authority.

597.20. Findings and purpose. The city council is concerned about potentially unknown or adverse impacts that the increased siting, development, re-development or expansion of data center facilities might have on the city as a whole and the neighborhoods and zoning districts in which such uses are located. The city's official controls do not currently define data centers as a separate use category although the prevalence of such facilities is expanding on a national, regional, and local basis. The city, through its planning department, has been studying potential amendments to its official controls in this area, including its zoning code, and desires to enact this interim ordinance to allow for the continuation and completion of this study to inform regulation of future uses of this type. The city finds that this interim ordinance should be adopted to protect the planning process and the health, safety and welfare of the citizens.

597.30. Study. (a) The department of community planning and economic development, in cooperation with other applicable city departments, is hereby authorized to conduct a study to evaluate the impact of data centers on communities citywide and to propose such amendments to the city's official controls and other regulatory devices that the department deems necessary and advisable in furtherance of the city's policy objectives.

(b) The study area consists of the entire city.

(c) The department of community planning and economic development shall return to the appropriate committee of the city council to present a progress report in no more than six (6) months' time.

597.40. Definition and restrictions. (a) For purposes of this chapter, the term "data center" shall mean a principal use, consisting of new or expanded space, where the primary function is to house computers and/or related equipment for the purpose of collection, processing, storage, or retrieval of data.

(b) From the date of introduction of this ordinance on May 21, 2026, through and including November 21, 2026, or upon completion of the study and adoption or amendment of the official controls affecting the subject matter of this interim ordinance, whichever occurs first, throughout the city of Minneapolis, no data center facility shall be established, re-established, or expanded. No zoning approval, building permit, construction permit, demolition permit, or administrative waiver for the establishment, re-establishment, or expansion of any data center facility shall be allowed or granted by any city department.

(c) The restriction imposed by this section shall not apply to data centers consisting of less than three-hundred fifty thousand (350,000) square feet of new or expanded space located in the downtown area bounded by Interstate 35W, Interstate 94, Plymouth Avenue, and the Mississippi River.

Consistent with section 525.830, these restrictions shall apply only to the issuance of permits for development for which an application has not been filed prior to the effective date of this interim ordinance.

597.50. Hardship. In cases of hardship, any person having a legal or equitable interest in land and aggrieved by the requirements of this interim ordinance may apply to the city council for a waiver of all or a portion of the applicable restrictions as provided in Chapter 525, Article VII, of the zoning code. A waiver may be granted where the city council finds substantial hardship caused by the restrictions and

finds that the waiver will not unduly affect the integrity of the planning process or the purposes for which the interim ordinance is enacted.

Whereas, Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) recently issued statements to the public that it was closing the left turn lane at the intersection of northbound Highway 280 and Broadway St. NE as part of its reconstruction of Highway 280 from Interstate I-94 to State Highway 36; and

Whereas, the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board has been seeking for over 100 years to complete the Grand Round Missing Link through Southeast and Northeast communities in the City of Minneapolis to connect to those parts of the city with the entire 54 mile Grand Rounds system to complete the vision of Horace Cleveland of a continuous parkway system; and

Whereas, Highway 280 runs parallel to the proposed Grand Round Missing Link route through Northeast and Southeast Minneapolis and serves tens of thousands of Minneapolis residents and businesses; and

Whereas, Broadway St. NE between Highway 280 and Stinson Boulevard has a daily traffic count of over 14,000 vehicles, and E Hennepin Ave. between Industrial Boulevard and 33rd Ave. SE has a daily vehicle count of over 19,000 vehicles; and

Whereas, the Broadway Street interchange at Highway 280 currently allows for a significant amount of traffic to continue in an east to west direction across Broadway Street to serve important destinations in the Mid City Industrial Park; and

Whereas, the Mid City Industrial area of Minneapolis is the primary and largest contiguous industrial area in the entire city serving businesses throughout the Metropolitan area; and

Whereas, MnDOT's determination to remove the left turn lane on Highway 280 at Broadway Street will increase the eastbound daily traffic count on E Hennepin Avenue from 280 by over 3,000 vehicles, which could also increase the traffic volume on the northbound traffic lane of Industrial Boulevard from East Hennepin to Broadway Street from 2,000 trips a day to up to 9,000 trips a day; and

Whereas, an average segment of the Grand Rounds system has a daily traffic load of approximately 4,000-6,000 which is consistent with the current traffic volume on Industrial Boulevard of 4,500 daily vehicles and that the closure of the left turn lane at Broadway and Highway 280 could quadruple the volume on the northbound lane of Industrial Boulevard between East Hennepin and Broadway, and this change in vehicle volume would be antithetical to the design use of that road as a segment of the Grand Rounds system; and

Whereas, these traffic pattern changes that result because of MnDOT's decision will significantly impact the road and design of the proposed Missing Link connection to the Grand Rounds system; and

Whereas, doubling the flow of traffic off Highway 280 onto Hennepin Avenue will also likely overburden the Southeast Como Neighborhood in Minneapolis and bring unneeded volume of traffic into a community that has always struggled with its industrial neighbors, especially as Hennepin County has recently narrowed Hennepin Avenue from a four-lane road to a two-lane road; and

Whereas, MnDOT did not engage in a public consultation process with neighborhoods, communities, citizens, or governmental units in Hennepin County; and

Whereas, Southeast and Northeast Minneapolis are communities that have been traditionally underserved by parks and the Grand Rounds system for decades, and for over a century;

The commercial premises, buildings and structures where persons are placed at risk of infection from communicable diseases facilitated by their design or use for high risk sexual conduct are in need of regulation, and of establishment of minimal standards for the prevention of the spread of communicable diseases for the protection of the public health, safety and welfare of the community.~~

~~219.510~~ 219.500. Definitions. (1) The term "high-risk sexual conduct" means sexual activities which are likely to result in the spread of sexually transmitted or other communicable diseases due to the exchange

of or physical contact with bodily fluids including but not limited to semen, blood, or vaginal fluid. Such activities include but are not limited to anonymous sex, sex with more than one (1) partner or multiple partners, and inconsistent condom/barrier use during sexual activity.

(4) The phrase "doors, curtains, or portal partitions" means full, complete, nontransparent closure devices through which one (1) cannot see or view activity taking place within the enclosure.

(5) The phrase "open to an adjacent public room so that the area inside is visible to persons in the adjacent public room" means either the absence of any "door, curtain or portal partition" or a door or other device which is made of clear, transparent material such as glass, plexiglass or other similar material meeting building code and safety standards, which permits the activity inside the enclosure to be viewed or seen by persons outside the enclosure.

~~219.530~~ 219.510. Powers of the commissioner of health. (1) In exercising powers conferred by this or any other section of this Code relating to communicable diseases, the Minneapolis Health Department and the commissioner of health shall be guided by the most recent instructions, opinions, and guidelines of the Center for Disease Control of the United States Department of Health and Human Services which relate to the spread of infectious diseases. Any regulations which are adopted by the board of health which relate to controlling the spread of infectious diseases shall also apply in exercising the powers authorized by this Code.

(2) In order to ascertain the source of infection and reduce its spread, the commissioner of health, and persons under the commissioner's direction and control, shall have full power and authority to inspect or cause to be inspected, and to issue orders regarding any commercial building, structure, or premises, or any part thereof, which may be a site of high-risk sexual conduct. If the commissioner of health determines that a hazardous site exists, the commissioner of health shall declare it to be a public health hazard and public health nuisance and shall then:

(a) Notify the management, owner, or tenant of the premises that the commissioner has reasonable belief that the premises, building, or structure is a hazardous site.

(b) Issue warnings to the management, owner, or tenant of the premises stating the reasons for the commissioner's belief that the premises, building, or structure is a hazardous site.

(c) Once such notice and warnings have been issued, the commissioner, or the commissioner's appointee, shall proceed as follows:

(i) After the management, owner, or tenant of the premises has been notified in writing as to the basis of the commissioner's determination, the management, owner, or tenant shall have ten (10) days to request a hearing before the commissioner or the commissioner's appointee for a determination as to the existence of such hazardous site. If the management, owner, or tenant of the premises does not request a hearing within ten (10) days of the notice, the commissioner shall then cause the premises to be posted with a warning advising the public that the premises have been declared a hazardous site. The commissioner of health shall cause orders to be issued to the management, owner, or tenant of the premises constituting the hazardous site to take corrective measures to prevent high-risk sexual conduct from taking place within the premises.

(ii) If the management, owner, or tenant of the premises requests a hearing, the hearing shall be held before the commissioner or the commissioner's appointee at a date not more than thirty (30) days after demand for a hearing. After considering all evidence, the commissioner or the commissioner's appointee shall make a determination as to whether the premises constitutes a hazardous site. The commissioner or the director shall then issue a decision based upon all evidence presented. If the commissioner or the commissioner's appointee makes a determination that the premises constitute a hazardous site, the commissioner shall then issue an order and cause the premises, building, or structure to be posted with a warning advising the public that the premises have been declared a hazardous site.

(d) If, within thirty (30) days from issuance of the orders to the management, owner, or tenant of the hazardous site, the commissioner of health determines that such corrective measures have not been undertaken, then the commissioner of health may order the abatement of the hazardous site as a public nuisance, which shall be enforced by mandatory or prohibitory injunction in a court of competent jurisdiction; or may secure a court order for the closure of the premises constituting the "hazardous site" until the owner or tenant of the premises, building, or structure is in compliance with the standards set forth in section 219.520 has taken corrective measures.

145.20. Gender-Affirming and Intersex Care. (a) *Definitions.* For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply:

(1) *Gender-Affirming Care* means all medical, surgical, counseling, or referral services, including telehealth services, that an individual may receive to support and affirm the individual's gender identity or gender expression and that are legal under the laws of Minnesota.

(2) *Intersex Care* means all medical, surgical, counseling, or referral services, including telehealth services, that an individual may receive related to natural differences or variations in sex characteristics or reproductive anatomy and that are legal under the laws of Minnesota.

(b) The city is a safe-haven for gender-affirming and intersex care. The city acknowledges that minors living independently may consent to their own gender-affirming or intersex care. No city personnel may use a person’s age or parental status as a basis to cooperate with anyone seeking to prevent or punish legal healthcare.

(c) Unless required by law, city employees, representatives, and contractors may not use city facilities, property, moneys, equipment, data technology (e.g. license plate recognition, surveillance video, computers) (“city resources”), or city personnel to interfere with the ability of any person to receive gender-affirming or intersex care, to interfere with the ability of any person to advocate for another person to receive gender-affirming care, or for enforcing federal laws that prevent or limit gender-affirming or intersex care.

(d) Unless required by law, city personnel may not disclose any private data, medical information, or surveillance data, including but not limited to traffic or security camera footage, regarding a person's gender-affirming or intersex care.

(e) The city will not enter into any agreements requiring it to share data or resources to interfere with, enforce bans upon, or criminalize gender-affirming or intersex care.

(f) To the extent permitted by law, the city's employee health insurance plan must offer coverage for all eligible city employees and their dependents that includes gender-affirming care benefits.

(g) The administration must ensure that the city's employee health insurance plan offers coverage that addresses the healthcare needs of the intersex community.

145.30. City funds, facilities, and data. (a) The city will not accept or distribute grant funds that have any conditions that require the city to limit the rights of individuals based on gender, gender identity, gender expression, or sexual orientation.

(b) When constructing or remodeling a city-owned building, the building must provide at least one (1) Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessible all-gender restroom on every floor with restrooms. When leasing a new city building, the building must, to the extent reasonably feasible, provide at least one (1) ADA accessible all-gender restroom on every floor with restrooms.

(c) For existing city-owned or leased buildings without all gender restrooms, the city must ensure that any gender-specific signage on existing single-user restrooms be promptly replaced with gender neutral signage.

(d) No person may be denied access to a restroom or changing facility that accords with their gender identity in any facility owned or operated by the city.

(e) The administration must create policies or procedures governing the city's collection of data from the public related to sexual orientation and gender identity. Factors that should be considered in creating these policies or procedures include:

(1) The potential for anonymization of data;

(2) Safe storage of data;

(3) Classification of data under the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act and other relevant law;

(4) Opportunities for disclosures on how data will be used; and

(5) Balancing the need to collect data so the city has information necessary to support the 2SLGBTQIA+ community and deliver needed services with the privacy interests of the individuals from whom the data are collected, to the extent legally permissible.

145.40. Outreach and engagement. (a) The administration must report annually to the appropriate committee of the city council on its outreach and engagement efforts to the 2SLGBTQIA+ community. The report should include at a minimum a description of the administration's outreach and engagement efforts and any metrics on the effectiveness and results of those efforts.

(b) After the report is presented to the city council, the commission on civil rights must review the annual report.

(c) If the City Council creates an advisory body that focuses on the 2SLGBTQIA+ community, that body must review the annual report after the report is presented to the city council and may provide the administration, the city council, and the public with feedback on the report and the administration's outreach and engagement efforts.

145.50. Complaints, discipline, and reporting. (a) Violations of sections 145.20 or 145.30 (d) of this chapter by employees are subject to disciplinary action.

(b) Summary data about the number and disposition of complaints must be reported to the city council by June 30 and December 31 each year.

(c) If a complaint is filed alleging a violation of sections 145.20 or 145.30 (d), in the course of investigating the alleged violation, no complainant or witness may be compelled by the city investigating authority to provide their gender identity or sexual orientation.

(d) The city must preserve all data related to complaints under this section for at least twelve (12) months after the complaint is closed.
